WELLING UNITED

Welling United Football Club were founded in 1963. An incredible journey in the early years saw the club rise from an U15 Sunday youth team to the heights of the Football Conference where the Wings remained for a remarkable 14 years. History has proved this to be one of the most astonishing journeys in the modern football era.

Originally formed in 1963 with just one youth team playing in local league football on a nearby park pitch, the club expanded its youth system before embarking on a period of Saturday football in the London Spartan League. Membership of the Athenian League and Southern League (South) followed.

For the first 15 years, Welling played on a sports ground at nearby Butterfly Lane, Eltham, before taking their present ground at Park View Road, after the demise of Bexley United who, at the time, were members of the Southern League.

After progressing from park football to senior football in a relatively short space of time, success was to continue with three promotions within five years. Initially winning the Spartan League and then after three more seasons in the Athenian League, progression and election to Southern League rounded off a marvellous period of success.

This continued after just one more season when promotion to the Southern League Premier Division was secured after the league was re-organised. In the fifth season in this division, the Wings romped to the title by a record 23 points after an incredibly exciting season and were promptly promoted to the Conference.

Welling found life in the Conference much more of a challenge and although they were one of the most consistent sides during their 14-year spell in non-league's top flight. Success in the Conference was limited to four County cup wins.

The Wings dropped out of the top flight when they were relegated on the last day of the season in 1999/2000.

After four years back in the Southern League Premier, Welling finished just high enough to qualify for the inaugural season of the newly formed Conference South as the FA restructured the leagues so that two fed into the Conference which became Conference National.

Welling's first foray in this league in 2004 was a struggle under the guidance of former England defender Paul Parker. With the Wings languishing near the bottom for the first three months of the season Parker left the club by mutual consent.

Adrian Pennock took charge of the struggling Wings and guided the Wings to safety in 16th place. The next season was one where it was exciting to be following Welling again with notable success in the FA Cup where they lost in the First Round away to Huddersfield Town.

The FA Trophy also proved rewarding where Welling drew Woking away and after a thrilling match narrowly missed out on a place in the Fourth Round when they let a 2 goal lead slip and finally went down 3-2. The Wings spent most of the season in the play-off places but a succession of draws, and a few defeats at the end of the campaign saw Welling finish the season in ninth place.

They continued their improvement with an 8th-place finish, missing out on a playoff spot by four points. In that season the Wings reached the Quarter Final of the FA Trophy, which had only been managed once before in the clubs history. Grays Athletic eventually knocked the Wings out with a win at Park View Road. The final game of the season was the last for the management team of Adrian Pennock and Phil Handford who both departed.

Neil Smith replaced Pennock as manager but struggled and Welling were once again at the wrong end of the table for the first half of the season.

Smith left the club and was replaced by Andy Ford who managed to keep the Wings afloat in the league that year. 2008-2009 saw Welling United become a real force in the Blue Square South and they won the Kent Senior Cup with a 6-1 defeat of Whitstable Town in the final, the Wings' first trophy for ten years. Ford's side finished 7th, the highest ever for the Kent side in this division.

After a disappointing start to the 09/10 campaign, with the Wings lying in 18th position after 12 games, Ford resigned and former Welling United player Jamie Day was appointed First Team Player-Manager in November 2009. Day selected another former Welling player Barry Ashby as his Assistant, with Dean Frost also joining from VCD Athletic as First Team Coach. He guided the Wings away from relegation and steered them to a final position of 9th in the Blue Square South table.

At the start of the 2010-11 season, the Wings were rocked by the news of a winding up order by HMRC on the 12th August. Given 14 weeks to pay the outstanding debt the Wings' fans showed their devotion to the club raising almost all the £60,000 needed to avoid the club going bust. Despite this, they were still deducted five points by the Conference and were handed a transfer embargo lasting until March 2011.

Against all the odds, Day's side held a place in the playoff positions for the majority of the season playing wonderful attacking football. A fantastic run of results against the Wings' main rivals looked to have secured their place in the top five. However fatigue eventually caught up on the small squad and dropped points at the end of the season proved costly as the Wings missed out on the playoffs by one point. They still finished sixth, their highest position in the Conference South ever, and their highest league position for ten years.

2011/12 saw the Wings climb to their highest league position for 26 years finishing third in the table and earning their first ever venture into post-season football. After reaching the playoff final with a 2-1 aggregate win over Sutton United, the Wings were defeated by their arch rivals Dartford by a score of

1-0 at Princes Park meaning another year in the Conference South. That season saw Welling United finally regain their place in the Conference Premier after Jamie Day's team set a new Conference South league record of 12 consecutive wins and overcame a 10 point deficit by runaway leaders Salisbury City to win the league by four clear points.

In their first season back they enjoyed a comfortable season and would have finished higher had they not had a poor run at the end of the season with safety already guaranteed. However, that proved to be the pinnacle. After all seemed to be moving along nicely, a vacancy arose at Ebbsfleet and Day, along with his management team, found the lure too great and departed.

Jody Brown came and went, then Loui Fazakerley took over the reins. Although Welling survived that season by the skin of their teeth there was no escape the following season and they finished rock bottom.

Towards the end of that season Mark Goldberg bought the majority share holding of the club and also took on the role as team manager.

Back in the Conference South, but now known as the National League South, Welling again struggled and Goldberg stood down to concentrate on off field affairs as he looked to re-build the whole structure of the club.

Having finished a disappointing season but safe from relegation, and with Goldberg now chairman, former player Jamie Coyle was appointed manager. 2017-18 was an improvement although it tailed off towards the end and Welling missed out on a play-off position and Coyle departed.

Steve King was invited to be the manager for the following season and he led Welling to a third placed finish and a play-off final but defeat in a tight game at Woking meant that there was to be no promotion. Over the summer, another management overhaul saw King depart with Goldberg restoring himself as manager

for the 2019-20 season however disappointing results caused him to stand down and Bradley Quinton was appointed as manager in January 2020. There was an immediate improvement before the season was curtailed, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, with the club safely in mid-table.

Uncertainty before the 2020/21 season resulted in another squad overhaul and sadly the team failed to gel so one year and two days after joining, Quinton left the club to be replaced by experienced manager Steve Lovell. Covid-19 once again interrupted the season and a National League restructure meant that only the bottom team would go down the following year. Welling reduced the budget and struggled. Lovell left after a poor start and Peter Taylor came and went before Warren Feeney guided the Wings to safety.

Goldberg's ownership finished at the end of that season and Feeney was appointed by the new board to build a more competitive squad for 2022/23, with his side securing a mid-table finish.

The summer of 2023 brought about more change following Feeney's departure, with former Eastbourne Borough boss Danny Bloor stepping into the dugout at Park View Road ahead of the 2023/24 season.

Despite promising performances, the Wings found themselves deep in relegation trouble, with Bloor departing in January 2024, replaced by Rod Stringer.

Stringer, assisted by Kevin Watson, master-minded a remarkable turnaround which saw Welling pull themselves out of the dropzone and seal survival with relative comfort by the time the season came to a close, guaranteeing sixth-tier football for yet another campaign.

A 40+ year stay at step two would come to an end the following season, however, with 2024/25 proving to be the season that the Wings would be relegated to the Isthmian League Premier Division.

Stringer departed the club in March 2025, with the club's relegation confirmed in April following a defeat at the hands of Maidstone United on Good Friday.

Despite relegation, Welling were able to toast success in the Kent Senior Cup under caretaker boss Brian Statham, winning the competition for the fourth time in the club's history thanks to a 1-0 victory over Ebbsfleet United at Gillingham's Priestfield Stadium.

MEET THE WELLING MANAGER

Lee Martin began his career as a trainee with Wimbledon, where he caught the eye of many Premier League teams.

Pursued by a number of other top clubs, including Arsenal, Liverpool and Tottenham Hotspur, he signed for Manchester United on 17 December 2003, following a week-long trial in October 2003, during which time he made one appearance for the Manchester United Under-19s team.

The compensation package United paid Wimbledon is estimated to be approximately £1 million, with £200k being paid up front, and the rest in instalments based on both his and Manchester United's performance.

Over the remainder of the 2003–04 season, Martin made seven more appearances for United's various youth teams, and was even named as an unused substitute for the Reserves in January 2004.

The following season, Martin began as a regular in the Under-18s, but he was soon promoted to the Reserve team, where he began to flourish, scoring goals as well as setting them up, including a hat-trick in one game against Bolton Wanderers Reserves.

The 2005–06 season was even more auspicious for Martin; after being named on the bench for two UEFA Champions League group games, he finally made his first team debut in the League Cup against Barnet on 26 October 2005. He was substituted after 75 minutes, allowing Darron Gibson to make his own first team debut, but he was a constant threat to the Barnet goal.

In January 2006, Martin joined United's feeder club, Belgian Second Division side Royal Antwerp in a loan deal until May 2006, to gain regular first team experience. During that short spell, he earned the Royal Antwerp Fans' Player of the Year award, and earned the fan-chosen Man of the Match award in five consecutive games. In the run-up to the 2006–07 season, Martin played in six of United's seven friendlies following their summer tour of South Africa. Their match against Celtic attracted the



attention of Celtic's Glasgow rivals, Rangers, who sought to take him on loan for the first half of the season.

Seen as not quite ready for the Premier League, Martin joined the Scottish club with a view to an extension of the loan to the end of the season. After a succession of injuries he failed to establish himself and returned to Manchester United in December 2006, having made just 10 appearances.

Martin returned to United for the 2007–08 season, and toured the Far East with the club in July 2007. He played in two of the four matches, and scored a spectacular goal against Chinese side Guangzhou Pharmaceutical on 27 July 2007, before being replaced by Patrice Evra. He was again named as an unused substitute for the Community Shield against Chelsea on 5 August 2007. Had he played in the game, it would have been his third game in as many days, having played a total of 149 minutes over the previous two games.

On 26 September 2007, Martin started the League Cup Third Round match against Coventry City, but, with United 1–0 down at half-time, he was substituted, Fraizer Campbell his replacement.

On 3 May 2025, Lee Martin was appointed manager of recently relegated Isthmian League Premier Division side Welling United

Billy Vigar's first half goal and a wonderful Ryan Davidson header from a corner in the 73rd minute gave Chichester their first victory of the 2025-26 campaign against Hashtag at Parkside in Essex.

Miles Rutherford, Dabba & Co were without midfielder Lloyd Rowlatt and defender Jamie Horncastle who both started in the goalless draw away at Whitehawk midweek so new signing Ciaran Martin got his debut in the middle of the park and Curtis Da Costa accompanied Ben Pashley in the heart of the defence with skipper Rob Hutchings and Davidson as full backs either side of Kieran Magee in goal. Joe Moore once again lined up as the holding player behind Joe Clarke, Isaac Bello and Emmett Dunn with Billy Vigar No9.

The Tags did the double over Chi last season, thumping the Sussex side 4-0 at Oaklands Park in November and winning 2-1 in the reverse fixture thanks to a Misha Djemali 95th minute strike in February. Lewis Rustell, Theo Bennetts, Bertie McDonald, Ethan Prichard and Preston Woolston were on the bench.

The Lillywhites had defending to do in the opening minute at Aveley as Pashley cleared and the hosts won a throw off Clarke. Then Bello and Vigar got things going and Martin headed into the danger area only for Hashtag keeper Jamie Grossart to kick the ball away as the visitors won their first throw-in which Davidson took.

Next, Moore found Bello with a lovely pass that Nathan Wilson eventually steered out for the game's first corner. Hutchings delivered this and Clarke's header was hooked away.

Not for the last time, the home team were flagged offside five minutes in before Clarke lifted a shot over the bar after Pashley and Martin combined. Djemali and Toby Aromolaran then instigated a move that also led to an offside, and Clarke

earned the away side a free-kick which Hutchings took only to lift it over the bar.

Bradley Sach threatened on 13 but hit wide of the mark and at the other end a Hutchings' cross was deflected for a second corner which Hutchings again took and Pashley almost scored the opening goal with a decent effort that Grossart spectacularly saved.

Bello launched a long throw in the following Chi attack but Clarke's header didn't really trouble Grossart. Martin headed away Emmanuel Robe's delivery in the 16th minute and Sach was flagged once more.

120 seconds later Dunn got fouled by Jermaine Anderson and Hutchings' set-piece picked Martin whose attempt was turned away by the Tags' back line and Bello this time was impeded on the edge of the box for a free-kick which Hutchings cracked into the wall with Bello blazing the rebound high and wide.

And then Vigar broke the deadlock neatly tucking away a delicious Hutchings' pass at the mid-point for his opening goal of the season.

The hosts pressed but a well-disciplined Chi back line caught Djemali offside and Martin headed the following ball away. Shot-stopper Magee claimed Smith's cross easily enough and his counterpart skewed the ball out for a City throw on the half hour before Pashley headed out Aromolaran's delivery.

Next, Davidson saw his shot ricochet off an opponent for a throw which a resulting Bello bomb forced Grossart to claim. And then captain Max Cornhill picked up a knock and had to be replaced by the lively Pigue Humble 10 minutes from half time. Hashtag won their first corner on 38 which was taken short to Robe and Djemali lifted the ball in and the hosts gained another one on the other side which Rutherford's men cleared.

Next, Vigar's run earned Chichester a corner of their own off Robe that Hutchings delivered and in the following attack Davidson's pass towards Dunn was a little too firm.

Da Costa somehow headed the ball out for a corner which Robe took and Hutchings cleared, and in the couple of added minutes before the break a bit of Robe skill saw him dance into the box only for Vigar and Moore to deal with the danger effectively.

Neither team made any more changes at the interval and Clarke turned the ball out for a Tags throw in the 46th minute. Bello won Chi a throw as well 60 seconds later and Aromolaran blocked a Da Costa pass for a visitors' goal kick.

Then Martin tried his luck with a shot that spun out for Clarke to have a go on two occasions and also a third attempt that was diverted for a Bello throw. Robe, a threat all game, lost his footing in the penalty area when well-placed and Djemali struck one straight at Magee.

A slick move then resulted in Aromolaran getting flagged offside and Magee denied Sach's fizzing shot. The equaliser came on 54 minutes when Aromolaran did both Davidson and fellow defender Da Costa down the left flank and the hapless Hutchings turned the consequent cross beyond Magee and into his own net.

Robe was replaced by Luke May-Parrott before Davidson got caught highly by Smith who received a yellow card in the 57th minute. Prichard and Rustell then came on for Martin and Vigar as Chichester rejigged and Dunn made a fine tackle.

Sach was adjudged offside and Anderson booked on 62. Bello pulled a punch out of Grossard with another long throw and Da Costa tried to find Rustell as the match swung this way and that with Aromolaran firing over the woodwork; Hutchings hooking away a throw; and Prichard stealing the ball and attempting to link up with Rustell.

Next, Bello drove one just wide and Harry Haysom conceded a corner under pressure from Rustell. Captain Hutchings delivered this and Davidson grabbed what proved to be the winner with a fine header at close range with 18 minutes of normal time remaining.

Hashtag won a corner off of Da Costa on 75 which Djemali took short and the hosts bagged what they thought was a leveller but George Barker's assistant

it out for another offside. "You Don't Know What You're Doing" chanted the Tags' faithful before Prichard fired one way off target after nice stuff from Bello. Clarke was exchanged for Preston Woolston in the 78th minute and Haysom intercepted a ball intended for Prichard from Bello.

Sach blasted a shot at Magee after a promising move that led to a corner and one on the other side which Pashley, resolute all game, headed away. Then Smith gave the ball away needlessly but the hosts subsequently rebuilt and with 4 minutes of normal time remaining Rustell failed to get a decent connection when clean through.

Bello bobbed and weaved into the box after good work from his teammate Moore and Anderson earned a Hashtag corner that Djemali took and Magee safely gathered. May-Parrott delivered another in time added on that Pashley conceded and the Essex team won two more as they desperately pressed for the all-important equaliser.

Bennetts replaced Bello late on and Tags sub Kegan Caull pulled one wide before the hosts headed over with the last chance of the match. As a consequence, unbeaten Chi move up to 10th place in the Isthmian premier division with Hashtag one point below having won one, drawn one and lost one of their opening three games.

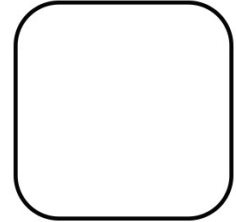

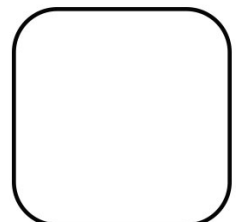
