## WHITEHAWK

Whitehawk are Brighton's premier non-league club. Founded in 1945, the Hawks have had two periods of played there was a Sussex County League Division 1 unprecedented success as they have risen up the football pyramid from a team playing parks football to be within one game of an FA Cup third round tie at Everton in 2015.

Between 1948 and 1952 the Hawks were promoted 4 times to reach senior county level where they remained until 2010, when three further promotions in four seasons took them to just two leagues below the Football League. The club was founded in 1945 as Whitehawk & Manor Farm Old Boys FC and entered the Brighton Junior Cup league.

The club's first match was a 5-3 away win on 13 October 1945 against Hove County Old Boys at Hove Recreation Ground. Whitehawk & MFOB then joined the Brighton, Hove & District Football League, winning four titles and their first major senior trophy, the Sussex Senior Cup by beating Eastbourne Town 1-0 at Woodside Road, Worthing in 1951. The Sussex Senior Cup win completed an unprecedented series of cup wins at junior, intermediate and senior levels in successive seasons, which still stands as a record in non-league football.

Just how far the club had come in such a short time was illustrated by the fact that the reserves won the Sussex Junior Cup in 1952, beating Selsey 3-1, so securing a trophy at the same level that the first team had been playing at, just four years earlier.

Sussex County League 1952-2010 The club was admitted to the Sussex County League Division 1 in 1952-53 and finished third in their first season. The Hawks' first county league game was a 4-1 win at Crawley on 31 August 1952.

The Hawks were Division 1 runners-up for three successive seasons from 1954-55 onwards, as well as Sussex Senior Cup finalists in 1954, losing 1-0 to Horsham at the Goldstone Ground in front of a crowd of 5626. For the 1954-55 season, Brighton Corporation allowed the club to move onto a permanently enclosed pitch at the north end of East Brighton Park, on what is now the home pitch,

known as the Enclosed Ground. The first match game against Southwick on 1 September 1954, which the Hawks won 6-2. The Hawks won the Sussex RUR Cup for the first time in 1955, beating Eastbourne United 1-0 after extra time at the Goldstone. The club were never out of the top five in the County League Division 1 for the rest of the decade and changed their name to Whitehawk FC for the start of the 1958-59 season.

In 1961-62 under manager Billy Thew, Whitehawk won the first of four County League One titles as well as the Sussex Senior Cup, beating Eastbourne United 4-0 at the Goldstone. Billy Ford scored 16 goals in Sussex Senior Cup football that season out of a personal haul of 93 for the season.

The publicity generated by a civic reception at the Royal Pavilion led to Brighton Corporation providing a grant of £3,500 for the club to erect a self-build grandstand with standing for 500 spectators. In 1963-64 the Hawks retained the championship by winning their last six matches of the season.

After losing the nucleus of the squad to Lewes the team then struggled and under manager Ron Pavey, who later became the Chief Executive of Brighton & Hove Albion, found itself relegated for the first time ever in 1967. They made an immediate return as Division Two champions in 1968.

The next nine years saw The Hawks continue to compete in the top division, during which time they lost 2-1 to Horsham at the Goldstone in the Sussex Senior Cup final in 1972. The Hawks were relegated for a second time in 1977. This time they were to spend four seasons in Division Two, having to apply for re-election in 1979 after finishing second from bottom, their lowest ever senior league placing.

The club gained its first club house in September 1980, using what was originally a prefabricated building that had been a temporary bank in Haywards Heath. A perimeter fence was added to the ground in 1981 and under new manager Sammy Donnelly, the Hawks won promotion from Division 2 as champions. In 1983-84 Whitehawk won County

League One for the third time, winning their last 18 games of the season.

1986–87 saw the Hawks finish as runners-up to Arundel. In 1988–89, again under Sammy Donnelly, Whitehawk had what was at the time their best run in the FA Cup, going out 2-0 in a fourth qualifying round replay to Bognor Regis Town. The home attendance record of 2,100 at the Enclosed Ground stood for 27 years. Floodlights were erected in 1988 and were first used in a match organised to mark the occasion against then First Division Luton Town on 21 March 1988. The game finished 2-2.

The Hawks won the Sussex RUR Cup for the third time in 1990–91, beating Peacehaven & Telscombe in the final 2–1, with youth player Darren Freeman, our future most successful ever manager, heading the winner. 1993–94 was another good season for the club, finishing once again as runners-up, this time to Wick. 2002–03 saw the club under manager and former youth player lan Chapman once again finish in second place, this time to runaway winners Burgess Hill Town.

The club finally achieved the league title success that had previously eluded them, winning County League 1 in 2009–10 under Darren Freeman, to gain promotion to the Isthmian League Division One South for the first time. The Hawks also reached the semi-final of the FA Vase, losing 4-1 on aggregate to Wroxham of the Eastern Counties League Premier Division.

#### Isthmian League 2010-2014

In their first season at the new level Whitehawk were in the title race but eventually had to settle for third place and an end-of-season play-off defeat on penalties to Leatherhead. The Hawks finished as Isthmian League Division One South champions the following season, as well as lifting the Sussex Senior Cup after beating Crawley Down 2–1 at the Amex.

The club achieved back to back promotions in the 2012–13 season by winning the Isthmian League Premier Division at the first attempt to earn a place in the Conference South.

#### National League South 2014-2018

The Hawks struggled in their first season in Conference South. After achieving three promotions in four years, Darren Freeman was sacked in January 2014 and replaced by Steve King.

The club then enjoyed their most successful season ever in 2014–15, finishing fourth in Conference South and earning a place in the play-off final against Boreham Wood, which was lost 2-1 after extra time. Whitehawk completed the season with a 5–0 victory over Lewes at the Amex to lift the Sussex Senior Cup.

In 2015–16 the Hawks reached the first-round of the FA Cup for the first time winning 5–3 against National League Lincoln City. Lincoln's next FA Cup defeat the following season came in the sixth round at the Emirates Stadium against Arsenal. In the second round the Hawks drew 1–1 at League Two Dagenham & Redbridge, following a dramatic headed goal in added time by Jordan Rose, which was broadcast live by the BBC during the afternoon sports programme. In front of a record crowd of 2,174 at the Enclosed Ground, the Hawks lost the second-round replay 3-2 after taking the lead through Danny Mills.

To force the match into extra time, Whitehawk again equalised dramatically in added time. The whole match was broadcast live by BT Sport. In February 2016, the club parted company with King after picking up just 9 points from the previous 36 available. Under Argentine Pablo Asensio, the Hawks finished the season in style, but lost in in the promotion play offs to Ebbsfleet United.

The next two seasons saw frequent managerial changes and over 100 different players used, culminating in the inevitable relegation for only the third time in the club's history in 2017-18. Not even the return of Steve King could arrest the club's fortunes and when he departed at the end of the season, he was replaced by the Hawks successful U18 manager Jude Macdonald. Unfortunately, the Hawks suffered successive relegations to return to step 4.



#### Shaun Saunders (Manager)

Returned as manager in November 2024 and ensured the Hawks maintained their Isthmian Premier status. Won promotion from the Isthmian South East via the play-offs in 2023. Took Peacehaven to the Isthmian Premier from the Sussex County League in a previous post.

#### Francis Hurl (Goalkeeper)

Signed on a season-long loan from Huddersfield Town in October 2025. A first year pro, the 20-year-old London born keeper started his career in Signed in July 2024 from Lancing. The 24-year-old the Crystal Palace academy.

#### Josh Shattell (Goalkeeper)

The 19-year-old signed in August 2025 after leaving Derby County U21 and quickly established himself as first choice keeper. Had a loan spell last season at Erith Town in Isthmian South East. Began his youth career at Tooting and Mitcham United.

#### Oscar Borg (Defender)

27-year-old left back, joined in October 2024 after leaving Welling United. Began his career in the U18 at West Ham United and then the U23 at Aston Villa. Has also played in Spain, Iceland and Wales.

#### Nathan Cooper (Defender)

Re-signed from Burgess Hill Town over the summer after being a key part of the promotion winning team of 2023. The experienced 31-year-old has also played for Littlehampton Town and Haywards Heath Town.

#### **Grant Hall (Defender)**

Vastly experienced ex-professional, Brighton-born central defender who joined in October 2025 after leaving Swindon Town. Counts Brighton & Hove Albion, Tottenham Hotspur, QPR, Middlesbrough and Rotherham United, as well as Lewes, among his former clubs. The 33-year-old had a loan spell with the Hawks in 2010.

#### Hugo Odogwu-Atkinson (Defender)

Signed in March 2025 from Hendon, the 26-year-old established himself as a first-choice central

defender. Began his career as youth player at Tottenham Hotspur.

#### Stefan Wright (Defender or Midfield)

Re-joined in December 2024 from Hythe Town. The 31-year-old fans' favourite counts Cray Wanderers, Sevenoaks Town and Sittingbourne among his former clubs. Can play in both full back roles as well as a wide midfielder.

#### Andrew Briggs (Midfield)

Eastbourne-born central midfielder has also played for Burgess Hill Town, East Grinstead Town and Lancing.

#### Florian Kastrati (Midfield)

23-year-old Albanian born central midfielder signed in August 2025. Played once in the football league for Crawley Town before spells on loan at Eastbourne Borough, Bognor Regis Town and Cheshunt. Has also played for Carshalton Athletic and Canvey Island.

#### Joel Daly (Midfield)

Re-joined in the summer after a season away at Horsham, where he picked up an Isthmian Premier winner's medal. The Brighton-born 25-year-old made 89 appearances in his first spell, having originally been an U18 player with the Hawks before College football in the USA. Prefers to play central midfield but can also play full back.

#### Charlie Harris (Midfield)

Re-signed for the third time in July 2025 from his home town club East Grinstead Town. Scored the winning goal in the play-off final to win promotion in 2023. The 29-year-old central midfielder began his career with Brighton & Hove Albion and Barnsley, before two spells at Horsham and a brief interlude at Chatham Town.

#### Oscar Lambie (Midfield)

19-year-old Australian born midfielder who signed in September 2025.



#### Archie McGonigle (Midfield)

Brighton-born 18-year-old central midfielder who joined from Lancing in August 2025. Played youth football for Lewes and Southend United before a short spell at Ramsgate.

#### Harry Bridle (Forward)

Sussex-born 19-year old striker who signed for his second loan spell from Gillingham in August 2025. A from Sussex neighbours Newhaven. Played for the former Lewes youth player, he has also been on loan Hawks youth team before being part of the at Sheppey United and Herne Bay. Scored ten goals with nine assists last season in twenty appearances.

#### Imran Kayani (Forward)

23-year-old Chertsey born winger re-signed in December 2024 from Westfield. Scored 14 goals in his first season after joining from Dover Athletic. Started as an U18 player at Sutton United before playing for Slough Town. Has made seven appearances for Pakistan in World Cup qualifiers and has also played for Cray Wanderers.

#### Charlie Lambert (Forward)

Brighton born 25-year-old with over 130 appearances for the club. Re-signed in December 2024 after a very short spell at Bognor Regis Town. Can play on the wing or down the middle.

#### Ed Leach (Forward)

18-year-old first year pro at AFC Wimbledon. The winger signed on loan in August 2025.

#### Josh Nandhra (Forward)

19-year-old Worthing born former youth player who played 18 games last season scoring 5 times. A very promising player whose form has seen his pushing for a first team start. Can play wide or down the middle.

#### Rob O'Toole (Forward)


Brighton-born captain of the Hawks promotion winning side in 2023, joined for the third time in December 2024. Originally signed from Horsham in 2022. Serial promotion winner in a career where he has also played for Burgess Hill Town and Littlehampton Town.

#### Rio Quaye (Forward)

18-year-old local striker who came through the Hawks youth ranks. Made his debut in 2024.

#### Alfie Rogers (Forward)

Brighton born 26-year-old central striker in his third spell with the club after re-joining in the summer promotion winning side of 2023.



## MATCH REPORT CRAY WANDERERS

### **ISTHMIAN PREMIER 8/11/25**

The spoils were shared between Cray and Chichester in a lively Isthmian Premier Division battle as Miles Rutherford's men picked up a point in Chislehurst after the goalless draw at home to Dulwich Hamlet last time out.

With the injured Ryan Davidson out for some time, Emmett Dunn moved to right back in the starting XI and Joe Clarke returned to midfield alongside Isaac Bello, Lloyd Rowlatt, and holder Joe Moore. Jamie Horncastle partnered Ben Pashley as the two centre backs with skipper Rob Hutchings on the left of keeper Kieran Magee as usual. Olly Munt and Ethan Prichard once again led the line and Curtis Da Costa, Theo Bennetts, Mo Jammeh, Lewis Rustell and Misha Djemaili were on the bench.

After the 'Last Post' and two-minutes silence to mark Remembrance Sunday, Dunn and Rowlatt linked up and won the visitors to Flamingo Park, just earned Chichester a first corner after the ball struck off the A20, a throw-in before the Canadian fouled Kareem Isiaka only for Wands' captain Frankie Raymond's free-kick to go too deep.

Raymond then fouled Rowlatt for a consequent Chi set-piece and referee Callum Parke had a word with him. Six minutes in, Isiaka went down in the penalty area - no spot-kick according to Mr Parke. Next, Hutchings challenged striker Alex Hernandez fairly and both Dunn and Isiaka received treatment following a clash of bodies.

Moments later a cross from Josh Williams caused Magee no issues and he gathered without any trouble before Moore cleared as Hernandez threatened once more. Lateef Adaja then whipped over a dangerous delivery that went out for a Chi goal kick at the back stick. It was all a bit cagey in this spell to be fair, before Dunn and Adaja tussled again and Rowlatt made a fine block to deny Reni Sutton's marauding run. Prichard's long-ranger was



well off-target and a ball towards him shortly after Prosper Keto which the No11 took. At the mid-point of the half Magee claimed a cross comfortably from the oldest club in London and Prichard spurned a glorious chance to put the Sussex side in front following clever stuff from Rowlatt.

A super tackle by the Chichester midfielder then ended a counter-attack by the hosts and at the other end Prichard's shot was blocked easily enough.On the half hour mark Raymond went over in the Chi box - again nothing doing, before Sutton and Isiaka combined only for the ball to spin safely into Magee's gloves.

Adaja passed up a chance and fired straight into Magee's arms as the match swung this way and that And the first yellow card of the afternoon was dished out to Williams, and Isiaka got away with one for a foul on Clarke with ten minutes to go until the interval.

Pashley timed his tackle to perfection and broke things up as Hernandez probed and the Chi defender the home team did the same at the other end. was also on hand to intervene moments later.

Next, Raymond's cross was headed directly at Magee by Hernandez and an inviting delivery from Prichard presented Bello with a decent opportunity but he couldn't get the final touch.

Rowlatt got caught by Raymond in the 43rd minute but Prichard's set-piece ended with a City infringement of some sort before Keto beat the offside trap only to cause little trouble with his cross.

Three minutes of additional time were added.

In this, Chi wasted a long Bello throw and Pashley picked Prichard with an intelligent pass only for his teammate to try a spectacular flick but to no avail. And the hosts blew an opportunity when the ball wouldn't sit for Williams on the stroke of half time.

Neither side made any changes at the break but Magee had to smartly save Williams' shot on the turn sixty seconds into the second period who blazed another effort past the post less than a minute later. Moore then delivered too deep and Cray earned their first corner on 51 after Hernandez tried his luck which got headed away by Clarke before the hosts were caught offside.

The ref had to talk to Hernandez for a foul on Clarke and Prichard was also spoken to as well shortly after for an indiscretion. Adrian O-Gyamera did Rowlatt only for his cross to get collected by the Chichester custodian and Horncastle, in fine form again, cleared without any trouble as the hosts pressed once more.

Isiaka fired narrowly wide after good work from Adaja who almost got in himself in the next attack. Hutchings' delivery on the hour was simple for Wands' keeper Ethan Binnie and either Isiaka or Williams were flagged offside by an assistant much to the home fans' chagrin.

Harry Waldock was then booked for pulling Rowlatt down who was replaced by Djemaili along with Jammeh for Munt in the 63rd minute as Chi rejigged. Dunn blew a chance when the visitors broke through and a Chichester corner by Hutchings evaded everyone. Cray sub Ashley Nzala was adjudged offside when Dunn had seemingly been caught out before a lovely cross from Frankie Morgan almost set up the opener for the Londoners.

Bello then won Chi a corner which was wasted and

Rustell replaced Prichard on 73, and Nzala danced into the box but a steadfast Clarke hooked away.

Next, O-Gyamera did Bello down the left flank with 15 to go and the Chichester midfielder was denied by a smart-thinking Binnie in the Wands' goal who snuffed out the danger.

Moore then tidied up; Jammeh cut out a clever pass; Djemaili fouled fellow sub Raif Hand; and Hutchings struck one high and wide in the 82nd minute.

Dunn had his shirt tugged by Nzala before Djemaili somehow pulled one wide with five minutes of normal time to go. Hutchings' brilliant delivery led to no end product unfortunately and his hit from distance was saved by Binnie.

A Bello bomb of a throw fell to Moore but his shot went out for a goal kick in the last minute and Jammeh narrowly avoided a caution for a foul on Raymond but the set-piece came to Sutton who, with the three points on the line, blasted over when well-placed.

And right at the end of the additional three minutes, Jammeh couldn't get enough on his shot.

So, that's two clean-sheets on the bounce for Chi, as Cray, the division's draw specialists, drop to seventh in the league while the Lillywhites, with five games in hand on their opponents, sit in 15th spot.




