About US

Reading City Football Club, commonly known as The Cityzens, is a non-profitable, grassroots community-based football club based at the Rivermoor Stadium, located in Scours Lane, Tilehurst, Reading. The club is proudly affiliated with the Berkshire & Buckinghamshire Football Association and is an England Football Accredited Club.

Our formation came as part of Highmoor AFC's 50-year celebration in 2018. Club secretary Chris Gallimore took over the role in 1990 and recruited the now chairman, Martin Law, to become first team manager in 1992. Together, they assembled a strong squad of players, leading to significant success. The club thrived with regular promotions, league and cup doubles, and became the first club to win the current Thames Valley Premier League unbeaten. The reserves are still the only reserve side to win the same Reading Step 7 League.

After winning the league, promotion to the Uhlsport Hellenic League in 2012 required moving and playing at Palmer Park. The current location at The Rivermoor was secured in 2018, and after 50 years, it was decided to change the name to Reading City. This decision was not taken lightly; however, the community of Reading yearned for a semi-professional club behind Reading Football Club to represent Reading and give local players the opportunity to play for a Reading-based team as Reading.

The pathway for the club begins with the Sunday morning development centre for 4-6-year-olds and extends through to our First Team. This pathway will become the lifeblood of the club over the coming years.

Though Reading City FC was officially formed in 2018, our roots stretch back over a century.

Our journey began in the village of Highmoor, Oxfordshire, where local football flourished before evolving into Highmoor FC in 1967.

The club battled through tough times in the '80s before a revival led by Chris Gallimore and Martin Law saw success follow.

In 2001, we merged with Ibis FC founded in 1913 by Prudential Assurance becoming Highmoor Ibis. The merger marked a turning point, with league and cup triumphs including an unbeaten league title in 2003/04 and the Reading Senior Cup win at the Madejski in 2006. After a promotion to the Hellenic League in 2011, we moved to Palmer Park Stadium, enabling progression thanks to improved facilities. In our debut Hellenic season, we earned promotion to the Premier Division and twice finished runners-up.

We entered the FA Cup in 2013/14 and reached the Second Round Qualifying in 2023/24, our best run to date. We've also regularly competed in the FA Vase, reaching the First Round Proper several times. A move to The Rivermoor in 2016 formerly home of Reading Town brought us back to West Reading. The name "Rivermoor" reflects our history (Highmoor) and location (near the River Thames), symbolising our journey and growth. In 2018, we rebranded as Reading City FC, honouring our past while looking to the future.

This move united the legacies of Highmoor, Highmoor Ibis and Reading Town under one banner and brought renewed ambition to be the leading non-league club in Reading. We joined the Combined Counties League Premier Division North in 2021 having previously played in the Uhlsport Hellenic League and made history with the first-ever match in the new division. We've since reached play-offs and lifted the Southern Combination Challenge Cup in 2023/24. O

Our Youth Academy, launched in 2013 and rebranded in 2021 in partnership with John Madejski Academy, now boasts over 20 teams and competes in the FA Youth Cup, reaching the Second Round Proper in 2021/22. From Highmoor to The Rivermoor, our story is one of perseverance, pride, and progress and we're just getting started.

EMIRATES FA CUP EXTRA PRELIMINARY ROUND

MRTCH REPORT

The game nearly began with the perfect start for the Cityzens managing to bundle the ball into the back of the Cirencester net after just two minutes however the goal would be ruled out for a clear foul by The City player. The Cityzens would continue to pile the pressure on the Centurions box from a number of long throws in quick succession ultimately resulting in no real threat to Ronnie Newbery's goal. York would be called into action a few moments later holding onto a free kick from Price capping off an electric opening ten minutes with both slides trying to deliver an early blow to their opponents.

The hosts would be forced into an early change as Ethan Rose replaced injured Jayden Stratford. The game was very much being fought and stuck in the midfield with both sides struggling to create any clear chances, instead having to settle for snatches at goal and half chances. City would deliver a corner into the box that Newbery would fumble at the first time of calling before managing to recover and claim the second ball, surviving the scare and redeeming himself.

As we entered the final ten minutes of the first half Cirencester had the best chance of the match so far, coming from a goal kick sent up long and the flick won ahead of the Cityzens backline but the resulting shot for close range would be dragged wide. Moments later the Centurions thought they should have been awarded a penalty but the referee was unmoved by their appeals. Reading City's final chance before the break came from brilliant build up play from Club Captain Adam Cashin-Murray and Joe Pilling resulting in a shot that was unfortunately blasted well over. It was Cirencester however that would have the final chance of the half, a well worked corner would lead to Charlie York diving low to his near post and doing brilliantly to keep hold of the ball to deny any corner or rebound. As Chaz got back to his feet the referee would blow his whistle bringing the first h 'Cose9'

The second half opened in much the same fashion as the first half. With a lot of action in the middle of the park with both sides struggling to create clear chances for an opening. There was an a second switch for the hosts as Ollie Pitts makes way for Jonty Welch. The best chance of the match for the Cityzens was headed just wide of the post by Palmer after Cashin-Murray did brilliantly to play him behind.

A first change of the afternoon for City saw Ashleigh Artwell come on to bring fresh legs replacing Joe Pilling who had ran himself into the ground. Pressure from the hosts led to York being forced to dive low to his left parrying the ball well wide and away from danger. Cirencester would continue to pile on the pressure creating an opening and beating York with the strike low to the right, however Oliver Bourne was there throwing his body on the line to keep his side level, a fantastic block from the young man.

Another chance for the hosts was sandwiched between two City substitutions with Ben Holder coming on for Club Captain Adam Cashin-Murray and new-signing Riley Denny replacing Mckoy Palmer being made both sides of a dangerous effort from the right hand side from Cirencester's Bennett being blasted into the outer netting much to the Cityzens relief. As we entered the final ten minutes of this tie in the Extra Preliminary Round, two fantastic blocks would be made by City with Bourne again and Campbell getting their bodies in between the ball and net.

Final substitutions for the match for Reading City saw Tristan Campbell coming off for Jenson Mansel. City would have the final chance of the match with skipper Stefan Brown striking the ball at goal but Newbery was there to clutch the ball to his chest.



Founded in October 1889, Cirencester Town FC has a rich and varied footballing history. The club began in the Cheltenham League, where it secured multiple Division One titles in the 1920s and 1950s.

After periods in and out of the Gloucestershire Northern Senior League, Cirencester became a founding member of the Gloucestershire County League in 1968 before moving up to the Hellenic League. The club experienced both promotion and relegation in the 1970s but steadily progressed through the football pyramid.

In the 1990s, the team rose to the Southern League, winning the Hellenic Premier Division in 1995–96 and also lifting the Gloucestershire Senior Cup. The early 2000s saw more success, with promotion to the Southern League Premier Division in 2004.

Cirencester became known as a yo-yo club, bouncing between divisions throughout the 2000s and 2010s. Highlights include winning the Southern League Division One South & West in 2013–14 and claiming a second Gloucestershire Senior Cup in 2014–15.

Despite strong league finishes in 2018–19 and 2021–22, the club narrowly missed out on promotion via the play-offs. Following a 6th-place finish in 2023–24, Cirencester Town FC voluntarily stepped down to the Hellenic League Premier Division to restructure and build for the future.
